

Seoul is a paradise for shoppers, but let's start at the largest shopping hotspot in Korea: the Myeongdong district! If you're a huge fan of cosmetics and skincare, the trendiest clothes, mouthwatering delicacies, and anything that has to do with K-pop, visiting Myeongdong should be at the top of your list.





10:00AM - 2:00 PM

Stock up on your K-Beauty Essentials

Myeongdong is the go-to place for skincare and makeup brands for both locals and tourists as each block is filled with as many as twenty makeup stores! Make sure to wear comfortable shoes because you will surely do a lot of walking.

It's important to take note that some Korean staff aren't as fluent in English so they often use calculators to convey the price. Be sure to familiarize yourself with Korean currency well before heading into the Myeongdong district to avoid confusion and possible scams.

Street food galore

Along the vibrant streets of Myeongdong are endless choices of authentic Korean street food you can feast on. From kimbap (Korean rice roll), saewoo twigim (deep-fried shrimp), patbingsu (flavored Korean shaved ice), to tteokbokki (rice cake in sweet and sour sauce)...you name it, they have it. If you want to splurge and live a little, lobsters with cheese is a must-try for just 15,000 KRW.

Bask in Korean history and architecture in Myeongdong Cathedral

Getting there: Euljro (Line 2, Exit 5-6) then take a 7-minute walk or via Subway Line 4, Myeongdong Station Exit 5-8

Address: 74, Myeongdong-gil, Jung-gu, Seoul

Just at the end of Myeongdong street, you can visit one of the oldest Catholic Churches in Korea, the Myeongdong Cathedral.

Not only is it a peaceful destination to enjoy the weather and the beautiful views, but it's also a great place to learn more about Korean culture and history. The cathedral is also situated near other tourist spots such as Namsangol Hanok Village that's popular for their preserved Korean traditional houses, N Seoul Tower which overlooks the city of Seoul, and Namdaemun Market, a traditional market that offers a wide variety of food and goods.



4:00PM - 5:00 PM

Dine in a Michelin Bib Gourmand restaurant at Myeongdong Kyoja



Getting there: Subway Line 4, Myeongdong Station, Exit 8. Upon exiting the station, turn left onto Myeongdong 10-gil Road. Go straight about 150m to arrive at Myeongdong Kyoja

Address: 29, Myeongdong 10-gil, Jung-gu, Seoul

This famous Michelin-star restaurant, which only offers four items in the menu, is known for their knife-cut, handmade dumplings and kalguksu (noodle soup). Myeongdong Kyoja has been a family-run establishment since 1966, and is flocked by an impressive number of customers daily because of its dishes, including their signature kimchi.

Their modest decor and simple menu items that come in large portions at an affordable price makes it a must-visit when you find yourself in the bright and bustling streets of Myeongdong.



5:00PM - 8:00 PM

End your day with more shopping at Lotte Department Store

Getting there: Subway Line 4, Myeongdong Station, Exit 5. Then take a 10-minute walk to the destination.

Unlike other crowded shopping districts in Seoul, the 700 meterlong boulevard offers a welcome change of pace—one that's better suited for coffee-sipping and people-watching.

From high-end fashion and niche Korean brands to handmade European shoes and streetwear, Garosu-gil's varied shops have something for everyone.



1:00 - 3:00 PM

Visit Starfield Library, a massive public library home to 50,000 books and magazines

Getting there: Subway Line 2, Samseong Station, Exits 5 & 6

COEX Mall, aka the largest underground shopping center in Asia, is also home to a massive open library that has over 50,000 books. Known as the Starfield Library, the brightly-lit space located right smack in the mall features 2-story bookshelves that boast books and magazines of all genres within its 2,800-meter space. Since its opening, it has significantly increased the number of visitors to COEX Mall which had been steadily declining before its opening in 2017. Today, Starfield Library is recognized as one of Seoul's most Instagram-captured spots, captivating bibliophiles, locals, and tourists alike.

If you'd like to visit the library while it's calm and quiet, head there on a weekday as soon as it opens (10 AM). Be on the lookout for events too, ranging from book talks and lectures to art exhibitions and more.

Discover up-and-coming artists at Alternative Space Loop





Travel back in time at Bukchon Hanok Village

Getting there: Subway Line 3, Anguk Station, Exit 3

After your late morning tea in a traditional tea house, why not explore a village that's frozen in time? Wander around the criss-crossed alleyways of Bukchon Hanok Village, a carefully-preserved village right in the heart of Seoul. The traditional Korean houses are made of wood called "Hanok" that line the alleys of this quaint village. It will remind you of how Koreans lived centuries ago and serves as a beautiful juxtaposition to the surrounding modern neighborhoods.

You can enjoy a quiet walk among red bricks and wooden gates, and buy a few handmade crafts from the small shops. There are also many beautiful street art that can serve as the perfect backdrop for your Instagram photos. Just remember that there are people who live in these Hanok houses so do respect their privacy.






Street art and graffiti

Nicknamed "hip-jiro" by the young locals of Seoul for its many hipster gems, Euljiro is the hottest place to be. What used to be an industrial area crowded with oil-stained factories has been transformed by local artists into the hip spot that it is now. It's the perfect fusion of new and retro (or "newtro") which is becoming a hot trend among the Korean youth. With its close proximity to more popular areas like Myeong-dong and Dongdaemun, there's no excuse not to visit this Instagrammable neighborhood before leaving Korea.

Sewoon Arcade

Enjoy panoramic views of Seoul on the rooftops of Seun Sangga.

This rundown shopping complex built in 1968 is now a hub for all things cool and trendy. You can grab some snacks and drinks at popular shops like Holang-I and Ggeek Beer Company, and settle down on the mall's roof for a midday break while enjoying one last view of the Seoul skyline!


